Beloved Community

As we celebrate our new home on Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday, we are mindful of the role that InterFaith Works assumes in advocating for *beloved community*. Dr. King popularized the term that has captured the imagination of people of good will throughout the world. Dr. King believed that *beloved community* could be attained by a critical mass of people who were committed to and trained in the philosophy and methods of nonviolence.

Beloved community is a global vision in which all people share in the wealth of the earth. Poverty, hunger and homelessness will not be tolerated because international standards of human decency won't allow it. Racism, discrimination, bigotry and prejudice will be replaced by an all-inclusive spirit of sisterhood and brotherhood. International disputes will be resolved by peaceful conflict resolution and reconciliation instead of military power. Love and trust will triumph over fear and hatred.

Dr. King acknowledged that conflict was an inevitable part of the human experience, but he believed that conflict could be resolved peacefully and that adversaries could be reconciled through a mutual, determined commitment to nonviolence. Conflicts in *beloved community* should end with reconciliation of adversaries cooperating together in a spirit of friendship and good will.

Through its mission, vision and programs, InterFaith Works of Central New York aspires to continue to be one of the driving forces for the creation of *beloved community* in Central New York and to serve as an inspiration to other communities who wish to do the same.

InterFaith Works of Central New York

Founded in 1976, InterFaith Works is a nonprofit organization that builds bridges of understanding to affirm the dignity of *all* people and *all* faith traditions in Central New York.

Founded as the Syracuse Area InterReligious Council by a formidable group of civil rights and faith leaders, and led by Rabbi Theodore Levy (Temple Concord), The Rev. Dr. Jon Regier (New York State Council of Churches) and Bishop David Cunningham (Roman Catholic Diocese of Syracuse), the agency initially focused on advancing interracial understanding. It also was progressive in working toward interreligious understanding, first among Jews, Catholics and Protestants, and then expanding to include Muslims, Sikhs, Mormons, Baha'is and other faith groups.

Led by an interfaith and multiethnic Board of Directors and Round Table of Faith Leaders, InterFaith Works embraces different faith communities and the region's diverse people to address deeply embedded social divisions and to help the community find common ground on its issues. We strive to provide life-changing experiences that lead to the creation of a more equitable and loving community.

InterFaith Works social service programs address the needs of and empower people who are vulnerable, low income and targets of oppression, including refugees, the elderly and the institutionalized, through direct service and educational programs. InterFaith Works is committed to the belief that all people are deserving of dignity and respect regardless of ethnicity, faith tradition or social circumstances.

Our key programs include the following:



Ahmad & Elizabeth El-Hindi Center for Dialogue

- Serves as a regional hub for constructive community engagement and dialogue-to-action programs
- Brings disparate groups together to foster mutual understanding and trust, and to find ways to work together for the betterment of the whole community
- Each year, more than 2,000 unduplicated individuals participate in programs that include the Duck Race to End Racism, Starting Small suburban-city school exchanges, and police-community relations dialogues

Center for New Americans

- Settles more than 500 refugees from across the globe annually, helping them to find housing, learn English, secure employment and become citizens
- Provides post-settlement services to about 800 families who have been in the U.S. less than five years
- Since 1981, more than 8,000 refugees from all over the world have been helped in finding a safe haven in the U.S. and in living productive lives





Senior Services

- Senior companion program provides companionship and advocacy to frail seniors living in Onondaga, Madison and Cayuga counties
- More than 62,000 hours of assistance to 200 seniors is provided annually to help keep them socially engaged and living independently in their own homes
- Expansion is expected in 2015 to further serve the needs of elders in Central New York

Spiritual Care

- Provides interfaith chaplaincy services to approximately 2,000 people each month who are confined to hospitals, nursing homes and correctional facilities
- Offers worship services, study groups, spiritual counseling and prayer for those in need of solace and spiritual support
- Coordinates Spiritual Care Day, and manages the "Daily Inspiration" column for the Syracuse Post-Standard and Syracuse.com
